<b>Muslim Headdress &amp; Skirt</b>	Women wear these to pray, both at home and in the mosque.		
<b>Sarong</b>	Men and women wear sarongs around the house and special silk sarongs for weddings, baptisms (or naming ceremonies) and going to the mosque.		
<b>Songkok</b>	This is a traditional Indonesian man's hat to wear to the mosque.		
<b>Muslim Prayer Mat</b>	Men and women use these to pray on.		
<b>Bolo</b>	A wrapper for sleeping in – used by men and women.		
<b>Bark &amp; Bamboo Bag</b>	These are made mainly for the tourist trade nowadays; they used to be made by tribes living in jungle areas.		
<b>Bamboo &amp; Leaves Hat</b>	Hats are worn as protection from the sun when out working.		
<b>Brush</b>	This is made from bamboo.		
<b>Whisk</b>	This is made from wood and plastic.		
<b>Traditional Axe/Spade</b>	Made from wood, bamboo and stone, these are still used in some parts but have mainly been replaced with metal axes and spades.		
<b>Wind Chime (x2)</b>	Made from bamboo, these are hung outside houses to catch the wind.		
<b>Mosquito Coils (x2 boxes)</b>	There are lots of mosquitos in Indonesia.		
<b>Bottles of <i>balsam cap lang</i> (x2)</b>	This is a very popular cure for all ailments: cold, headache, rheumatism, weariness, insect bites and stings and cramps. Feel free to try it !		
<b>Fish Rack</b>	Many villagers still use open fires and gas stoves to cook on.		
<b>Plastic Crash Helmet</b>	These are as unsafe as they look. When they crack, they are repaired by stitching and are worn not for safety, but to avoid fines.		
<b>Gayung</b>	This is a plastic water scoop used for 'mandis' (baths). A <i>mandi</i> ranges from a wash by a well (pouring water over yourself) to a pool of water in a bathroom. Inevitably, many tourists get into the pool of water rather than use it to pour over themselves.		
<b>Tacro Balls (x2)</b>	Tacro is a popular sport. There are two teams and is similar to volleyball, but you must use your feet as opposed to your hands to get the ball over the net.		
<b>Gansing Top (with A5 instruction sheet)</b>	This is a spinning top used during Muslim festivals and as a toy.		
<b>Music of Indonesia CD</b>	Rough Guide music CD with information booklet.		
<b>Books (x3)</b>	World Focus; Indonesia, Indonesia; OXFAM Country Profile, Indonesia- Travel Survival Kit.		
<b>Plastic Wallets (x8)</b>	Out & About Around Indonesia (pink). Children in Indonesia (green). Religion (black). Fabric and Clothing (red). Education and Play (orange). Homes and Daily Life (blue). ### Indonesia Collection

This box was put together by Nicky Lawrence who was a volunteer with Voluntary Service Overseas (**VSO**) in primary and secondary schools in Sengkang for 2 ½ years. Nicky then went on to live in Ujung Pandang (now Makassar), the capital city of the south of Sulawesi. The photos are of Sengkang (cream backing), Ujung Pandang (green backing), Batik printing (blue backing) and general Indonesia photos (white backing). The day to day objects are all from Sengkang.

The island of Sulawesi is 1 hour's flight north of Bali. It is very tropical. The island is about the length of England! It is surrounded by beautiful golden beaches, with some of the most exquisite reefs in the world. The main religion is Muslim but there are some Christians and Anamists, mainly in Tanah Toraja. The main language is 'Bahasa Indonesia' although there are numerous local languages. In Sengkang we spoke 'Buggis' as well as Bahasa Indonesia.
